PROPHETS TO JUDAH

STORY POINT:

God sent prophets to tell the people to turn away from their sins.

CHRIST CONNECTION:

These prophets all told the people the same thing: stop doing wrong things and turn back to God. Later, Jesus came and said the same thing:

"Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is near." When we trust in Jesus, we can be close to God again.



Read: MICAH; NAHUM; HABAKKUK; ZEPHANIAH

Bible Story Recap:

- God loves His people and sent prophets to talk to them because they were doing wrong things.
- Micah warned the leaders to stop taking things that were not theirs and promised a good king would come from Bethlehem.
- Nahum reminded the people that God is strong and patient but will punish those who do wrong, and Zephaniah told them to stop worshiping pretend gods.
- Habakkuk asked God why bad things were happening, and God promised that everyone who did wrong would be punished.
